To give you, the volunteer, guidance and orientation

The Interpreter's Role

Have a conversation with the youth

Establish rapport

Learn to read the youth

Interpret what the attorney is saying



Ask for clarification

Tips Before Going Into Calls With Youth Clients

- Have the youth petition
- Sympathize with the youth
- Establish rapport
- Be friendly
- Be sensitive
- Don't be afraid to ask for clarification (from both the youth and the attorney)
- Interpret to the best of your abilities

What To Be Aware Of Before, During, And After A Call

- Testimonies/stories are highly sensitive, emotional, triggering, and traumatic
- No need to have SIJS experience or knowledge
- Be patient with the youth
- Take breaks and pauses
- Take care of yourself; be kind to yourself
